Terry & Marcia Brown

As we reflect over the years we may see how God works in the lives of others, and in our own lives. Case in point, Terry firmly believes it was God who led him to Marcia at Stormont-Vail Hospital.

In 1963 while visiting his mother at Stormont-Vail Hospital, Terry's brother, Roger, introduced him to Marcia and they visited for an hour and half. Roger gave Terry Marcia's address, but somehow he lost it.

At the time Terry worked at a water softening plant in Junction City and he said, "After I got all my work done, I would sit in the office and pray for a girl who would be right for me and I would let God choose her."

He also worked part-time at the Skelly Gas Station and one day the manager, who was going to see his wife at Stormont-Vail, asked Terry if he would mind riding down with him. Terry agreed and the manager joked saying that you might meet one of the nurses.

Terry and his boss went to the hospitality shop at Stormont-Vail and sitting at a nearby table were two women who smiled at them as they sat down at a table. Terry thought one of the ladies looked familiar, but couldn't recall her name. With the assistance of a walker, Marcia left and stood outside in the hallway waiting for her friend. Terry asked the name of the lady who had just left, and was told he should go and introduce himself. So Terry did just that and gave Marcia a big kiss on the cheek. A year later they were married on August 16, 1974.

Terry was born in Junction City on September 18, 1938, to Hiram H. and Almedia P. (Ocamb) Brown. His father owned and operated Brown's Floral and Greenhouse and his mother owned and operated Brownies Drive-In Restaurant. Terry has two surviving siblings, Roger and his wife in San Diego, and Cynthia and her husband residing in Gardner, Kansas. He has two deceased brothers, Dennis and Steven.

Terry attended the public schools in Junction City and graduated from Junction City High School. He continued his education for two more years at Emporia State Teachers College, now known as Emporia State University.

He began his working career at Farmers Stockman

Co-op and was employed there for 12 years. Terry then worked at the Home Mercantile Clothing Business, Junction City water softening plant and for the National Life and Accident Insurance Company. Terry spent the next 23 years employed by the State of Kansas, Capitol Police. He provided security for the Kansas Highway Patrol, the capitol complex and for the state office buildings.

Marcia was born in big red country, Lincoln, Nebraska, on March 16, 1942, to Kemit and Lylas Berggren. She is an only child. Kemit was manager of a meat packing plant in Lincoln, and then later at Morrill Meat Packing plant in Topeka. She attended Randolph Grade School and graduated in the class of 1961 from Topeka High School. She volunteered 17 years at the information desk of Stormont-Vail Hospital.

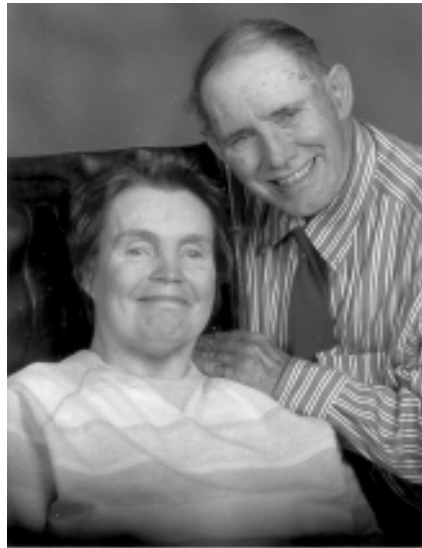
Although they were not blessed with children, they treat Millie Bush Brown, a Brittany, with much affection.

Medication Safety

The following recommendations are to make sure you use your medicines safely and effectively.

- Keep a list of **ALL** medications. This includes: prescription, non-prescription, herbal supplements, home remedies and medical foods.)
- Keep a list of **ALL** medications you are allergic to and their reactions.
- Keep a time schedule when medications are taken.
- Be sure you know the names, schedule, and strength of the medications.
- Know if you should avoid certain foods, beverages, other medicines, or activities while taking a drug— example: do not drink grapefruit juice and too much exposure to the sun.
- Read the written information that is provided with each of your medications.
- Ask questions if you don't understand
- If you are too ill or don't understand the directions, ask a family member or friend to help you.



- Discourage parents or caregivers from to pretend that medications are called “candy”. It is extremely dangerous and could lead to an overdose.
- Use child-resistant closures, if children are around.
- Keep all medications in the original container.
- **ALWAYS TURN ON THE LIGHT** when giving or taking medicine.
- Check expiration dates and discard all outdated medications.
- When traveling, be sure medications are stored out of the sun and in a cool dry place with a list of the medications. If traveling by plane keep them with you.
- Wear a medical alert bracelet or necklace if you have a life threatening disease or take certain vital medications.
- Notify the pharmacy immediately if your medication refills are not the same shape or color as before.

Be informed and be safe with your medications.

The Good Samaritan Fund Provides Assurance

The Good Samaritan Fund has provided assurance to residents of United Methodist Homes, Inc./Aldersgate Village for more than 50 years.

Established to assist residents whose financial resources have been depleted, the services provided have expanded and the number of residents who are assisted has increased steadily.

In 2005, 190 residents were helped at an expense of \$829,619. During that same period \$250,293 was received from contributors to the Fund. We are very proud that no resident has ever been asked to leave our homes because they could not pay for services.

The source of the contributions varies from individual donors to United Methodist Church congregations as well as other groups. Many of the individual contributions are memorials or honorariums and some are estate bequests.

The Kansas East Conference United Methodist Church members contributed \$33,868.45 through the annual conference special asking.

In addition, funds were raised through sales in our Bargain Shoppe which is operated by volunteers from Susanna Wesley United Methodist Church. Since the Bargain Shoppe opened on December 31, 2003, more than \$10,000 has been raised through the every other Friday afternoon sales to residents and staff at Aldersgate Village.

The staff and residents of Aldersgate are very grateful for the generosity exhibited the past year by our many friends. Their gifts have made it possible to continue to assist residents who have a need. We are also grateful to those volunteers who run the Bargain Shoppe and spend many hours sorting items for sale.

Without the help and support of many we could not provide for the basic needs of residents unable to provide for themselves.

As one recipient said, "I feel so comfortable and secure knowing that I will always be able to live here."
